AIMS AND SCOPE

The European Union's external relations are one of the raisons d'être of the European integration process. Its evolution over the years has incepted a complex external action, involving multiple actors and endowed with myriad instruments for its strategic planning and implementation. Thus, this course aims at familiarizing the students with the most advanced theoretical and political debates on EU behaviour in the international context; to study the EU's external action from its various dimensions (political, economic and security-related); to acquire theoretical knowledge on the European Union's external action from the analysis of readings and documents on fundamental aspects of such action; and to analyze the instruments of external action through case studies, with special emphasis on their versatility, limits and effectiveness.

With these aims in mind, the course is structured in three main blocks. The first deals with theoretical issues, focusing on the academic literature of Foreign Policy Analysis and then reflecting on the European Union as an international actor. The second block focuses on the institutional elements of the EU's external relations (competences, institutional architecture and actors involved, and public policy instruments used). Finally, the third block focuses on specific areas of development of the EU's external relations such as

development cooperation, humanitarian aid, international promotion of human rights, security and defense, neighborhood or the participation of the EU in multilateral international organizations.

CORE COMPETENCIES AND SKILLS

GENERAL

- Mastering the specialized language in oral and written form.
- Critical and self-critical reasoning.
- Applying the knowledge acquired and their problem-solving skills in new or unfamiliar environments within (broader) or multidisciplinary contexts related to their area of study.

- Identifying and assessing the impact of European integration in domestic legal systems and EU member-states' foreign policy, as well as in the external relations of the EU, in relation to different aspects of the political reality under study.
- Formulating, exposing and debating solutions to specific problems in international and multicultural environments, with original and complex arguments, both orally and in writing.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

- Assimilating the concrete actions and mechanisms used the European institutions responsible for its external action and in charge of defining the positions that the Union defends in the framework of other international organizations or multilateral meetings.
- Identifying the unilateral instruments used by the European institutions in the implementation of external action both in its regional and multilateral frameworks.
- Identifying the mechanisms used by the European institutions responsable for designing the EU's external action.
- Identifying the specific features of political decentralization in the different models of de-centralized States as well as identifying their integration in and the features of their relations with the European Union.



• Analyzing and evaluating the most relevant types of responsibility clashes between European institutions, States, and domestic de-centralized institutions.

TEACHING METHODS

This course consists of one in-person class session per week of two hours.

This course is mainly structured through in-class activities organized around theoretical sessions and a seminar. The theoretical sessions are taught through the teacher's explanation of the thematical schedule above, offering as well methodological guidelines for the independent development of the contents by the students.

The seminar sessions will serve to deepen specific aspects of the topics covered through discussion and resolution of issues raised by the texts indicated in the program. Students must get prepared prior to each session following the precise instructions that will be provided to them.

Note: Both the methodology of the course and the evaluation may be modified as a consequence of circumstances that may arise in the context of the management of the Covid-19 pandemic.

GRADING

WORKLOAD

This course includes the options of single and continuous evaluation. Students may choose the option they wish within the deadlines established by CEI's own regulations by filling out a form available at the secretary's office of the affiliated center. The minimum compulsory attendance for the two evaluations is 80% of the sessions.

In the case of **continuous evaluation**, the evaluation will combine continuous evaluation mechanisms and a final exam. The grades obtained in these two concepts will constitute the final grade. The continuous evaluation will be based on activities and tests carried out throughout the course, following the indications of the professors of the subject. The grades obtained in this concept of continuous evaluation will constitute 50% of the final grade. The grade obtained in the final exam will constitute the final grade.
